
# Intergovernmental Agreement Between BPD and Valley View School District

Park District and School District staff have been in dialogue for the last year reviewing and updating the existing intergovernmental agreement to include changes to facilities, schedules and modes of operation for facility usage and playground maintenance. This agreement has been established for the benefit of both agencies, but most importantly, for the benefit of the residents of the community through this excellent partnership to reduce duplication of facilities/services and utilize expertise of both agencies to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of both organizations to enhance services provided to the community in a fiscally responsible manner. The agreement has been reviewed by legal counsel from Valley View School District and Bolingbrook Park District.

Staff recommendation: Approve Resolution 25-25 approving the Intergovernmental Agreement Between the Bolingbrook Park District and Valley View School District 365U for the Reciprocal, Top Priority Use of Facilities and Services.

# Staff Engagement – BPD Summer of Fun Employee Challenge

The Fun Committee organized a variety of interactive activities throughout the summer to provide opportunities for staff to get to know each other as well as park district parks and facilities and enjoy recreational activities and community resources. In addition, staff were able to obtain points for prizes utilizing the Goosechase app by participating in a variety of activities, from staff and family pool party at Pelican Harbor to joining a summer basketball or pickleball challenge, spending time in their favorite park or doing their favorite activity, Christmas in July Aqua Aerobic Class, water balloon toss or bingo game to name a few of the 33 missions within the Employee Challenge. A total of 88 employees signed up for the Goosechase Challenge, and 33% of individuals collected points for their participation.



# Open Enrollment for Employee Health Benefits

• Employees will meet with representatives from Brown and Brown Insurance Group on August 26 to receive information regarding a variety of options and select employee health benefits through the open enrollment process for the 2025/26 plan year (October







# Web Registration Statistics – Registration Start Dates April 23 RID/April 26 FEE


















# BUILDINGS, GROUNDS & NATURAL RESOURCES

# **BGNR Operations**

#### General

- Staff are all working on the Park Districts 2026 general and capitol operating budget.
- Planning for Parkies 5K, Bolingbrook Soccer Club Labor Day tournament, Fall Fest, and the Howl-O-Ween 5k are all underway.

# **Buildings**

- Staff continue on a daily basis taking care of the pools; this includes checking chemicals, monitoring pumps, adding chemicals when needed, and other various maintenance needs to keep the pools running smooth for the summer months.
- Preparations for the reopening of the BRAC Indoor Pool are in full swing. Staff have started filling the pools, activated heating systems, and chemical balancing is underway to ensure a safe and comfortable environment for users. Following the completion of extensive contracted work, the custodial team has been diligently working on the final cleanup phase. Their efforts are focused on ensuring that the facility is clean, safe, and visually appealing ahead of the scheduled opening on August 25. All teams are on track and are confident the facility will be ready to welcome guests back as planned.
- Outdoor pools will be closed for the season effective August 25. Beginning immediately after closure, the building technicians will initiate the winterization process to properly shut down water park facilities and protect infrastructure during the off-season. Winterization activities will include the following:
  - o Draining all outdoor pools to prevent freeze damage.
  - o Covering water features to protect them from debris and weather exposure.
  - O Disconnecting plumbing in the expansion building, bathhouse, and concessions, including showers, sinks, and toilets.
  - o Blowing out all water lines using compressed air to prevent pipe bursts during winter.
  - Winterizing in-ground water spigots throughout the park to safeguard the irrigation infrastructure.

#### Grounds

- Garbage continues to be heavy, and staff on a daily basis are keeping the parks clean.
- A new Memorial Bench was placed at Bradford Park facing the pond.

#### **Parks**

- Playgrounds inspections, weeds removed, numerous small repairs have been made, and parts are on order for various playgrounds.
- Staff have been busy repainting picnic tables and power washing pavilions.

 Staff have been bringing items for day camp to DD for storage and bringing preschool items from storage to BRAC for the school year.

#### Athletics

- Athletic crew is working on LCSF & Indian Chase Meadows for the Bolingbrook Soccer Club's Labor Day Tournament.
- Fall athletics is starting and staff are working on field prep for flag football, baseball/softball, and trojan football field. It has been a busy last few weeks with the athletics crew working on athletic field repairs.
- Flag football/practice fields have been laid out and are ready for the season. Trojan field has been painted; they had a scrimmage on Aug. 9. Trojan's first home games are on August 31. Staff will paint again the week leading up to that date.
- Staff were excited to get two new ball field groomers; these new groomers have special attachments (mini sod cutter, broom, & weed tines) on them to do more field maintenance/repairs.

# Natural Resources Horticulture & Turf

#### Natural Resources

- The NRHT crews have been working to maintain our parks and athletic fields.
- The NR and horticulture crews took advantage of the decreased traffic around BJ Ward school to remove several dead and dying ash trees from along Recreation Dr and around the Annerino parking lot.

#### Horticulture

- The Horticulture crew has been focusing on watering flowers, weeding landscape beds, and preparing for the Parkie's 5K and the Labor Day Tournament.
- Staff weeded beds at Ashbury's and new mulch has been added.

# **Turf**

• The Turf crew has continued mowing, string trimming and edging sidewalks at our parks and sport fields to keep them looking great.

# **Project Updates**

- Indoor Pelican Harbor shutdown is nearing completion. Contractor removed and replaced the indoor lighting (doubling light output), removing and replacing concrete decking to meet ADA specifications, and replaced the diamondbrite finish of the leisure pool to an Interglass system. Re-opening is on track for Monday, August 25.
- Gateway Wetlands playground has hit a delay due to equipment delays for footings on the net structure. Staff are awaiting the new hardware to be installed. Anticipate opening of playground early to mid-September.
- Trail at Knights of Columbus has been delayed due to stormwater concerns with the Village of Bolingbrook. Staff are anticipating work to begin sometime in fall and be complete prior to close of 2025.
- The annual district sealcoating project is complete.
- The Lily Cache East Campus irrigation project has been completed. Project included a new submersible pump, VFD, etc to assist staff with being able to irrigate two zones at one time. Staff are happy with the changes made.
- Staff have completed reviews and discussions with VVSD on an update to the Intergovernmental Agreement between both parties. IGA is in the hands of legal to review with anticipation of being brought to the Board of Commissioners at the September meeting for action.

# RECREATION AND FACILITIES

# **Recreation Division**

#### Pre School

- There are 118 preschoolers enrolled for the 2025-2026 school year. This is a decrease of 18 enrollees as of the same time last year. Staff are working on promotion of preschool through multiple venues like the Library Outreach Program, back to school events and staff did attend Visit Your Local Park event in July. The Park District is aware of the James Mitchem Early Childhood Center expanding their Early Childhood Program with adding another facility attached to Oak View School which we knew may affect Park District Preschool enrollment.
- Preschool teachers will be getting classrooms ready for the upcoming school year the last two weeks of August and Preschool starts September 3 and 4.

# Early Childhood

59 children were enrolled in Preschool Camp for this summer which is 36 less than summer 2024 but is similar to enrollment to 2023. Early Childhood classes continue to have great enrollments for summer. Enrollments for June and July programs including Preschool Practice, Drawing Club, Summer Science, Wonders of Nature, Kindergarten Countdown and Lunch Bunch have 190 children enrolled compared to 143 enrolled for 2024. Little Learners has 133 children enrolled for summer so far with classes for August starting next week that will still accept enrollment. Enrollment is currently 10 more than in summer 2024.

#### Dance

- Summer session classes have ended for our youth and early childhood dancers. Our next session of adult dance classes begins on August 4. Currently there are 10 enrolled.
- Fall dance classes begin on September 8. This fall we have new offerings of Ballroom Dance available for youth and adults.
- Our BPD Dance Company officially kicked off their 2025/2026 season with their annual Choreography Camp July 21-25. Our team consists of 18 dancers from ages 5-11.
- BPD Dance Company Dancers will be participating in the Bolingbrook Pathways Parade on September 14.

#### **Theatre**

- Theatre Summer Showcase will take place on Wednesday, August 6 at 5:00 pm in the Annerino Multipurpose Room. This show is free to attend.
- Fall Theatre classes will begin on September 11.

# Day Camp

Camp registration for the 2025 season saw a total of 2,958 campers compared to 2,857 in 2024 and 2,483 in 2023. This puts the average number of campers at an additional 10 campers per week compared to 2024 and 47 additional campers per week compared to 2023.


# Discover Bolingbrook Challenge Coming to an End








# July Revenue

- There was extensive heat and rain in July that significantly impacted rounds of golf played. There were 15% less playable time for the month compared to July 2024.
- Overall golf revenue (greens fees, golf league, riding cart and pro shop revenues) fell short of budget by \$14,386 (9.7%) in July; but has exceeded overall revenue collected this year by \$8,061 over 2024.
- Restaurant revenue fell short of budget by \$6,852 and was \$2,902 over revenue collected last year for the month.
- Banquet revenue fell short of budget for the month by \$3,346.

# July Operational Expenses

- Overall operating expenses were well controlled for the month as well as year-to-date.
- Overall expenses are 2% below budget for the year.
- Payroll expense was over budget for the month by 3.6%. Payroll expense is 1.3% over budget for the year.


