# **ADMINISTRATION AND PERSONNEL**

#### Cultural Awareness/Sensitivity Training

- The monthly Operations Meeting on June 26 featured a team cultural awareness and sensitivity training session conducted by Dr. LeVar Ammons. The training was titled "Cultural Awareness & Inclusive Actions Becoming Stronger Together Through Meaningful Dialogue and Shared Understanding" involved 32 leaders of our organization. Attendees participated in a variety of interactive discussions to raise cultural awareness. The team discussed the definition of cultural awareness, the importance of cultural awareness, barriers to cultural awareness, and how to become more culturally aware and inclusive.
- The training encouraged our leaders to start with exploration of our own cultural awareness to identify our biases and reflect on our assumptions. Learn and educate ourselves through reading, studying and attending cultural events, and actively engaging and interacting in diverse settings while being respectful, practicing active listening and being open to feedback. An emphasis was placed on practicing empathy and perspective taking by seeing through the eyes of others, challenging stereotypes and focusing on individual experiences.
- The training inspired additional dialogue amongst staff following the training. Staff who attended expressed appreciation for the opportunity to engage in this type of training and willingness to participate in further training on the topic area.

#### **Destruction of Certain Old Audio Recordings**



















# **BUILDINGS, GROUNDS & NATURAL RESOURCES**

# **BGNR Operations**

## General

- Extra staff were on garbage duty for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July clean up on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, & 6<sup>th</sup> with excessive garbage in our parks system from renters and the general public using parks to shoot off their own fireworks. Staff were still cleaning up fireworks on Monday in the parks from the weekend.
- Staff are installing memorial plaques for the spring trees, and we will be installing one memorial bench.

## Buildings

- The buildings department purchased new LED lights for Annerino parking lot. The old lights will be removed and new ones installed by our building techs as time allows. These new lights will make the parking lot brighter and save on energy costs.
- Continuing preparation and scheduling for the BRAC indoor pool shutdown July 26 through August 24. General maintenance includes cleaning filtration systems, stainless steel polishing, general deep cleaning, pumps & valve replacements and many other various duties will be completed. This year the shutdown will be longer than normal as we will have contractors doing several jobs which include ADA concrete work, new lights, repainting the zero-depth pool, acid washing the concrete decking, new amenities, & fence work.
- Staff continue on a daily basis taking care of the pools; this includes checking chemicals, monitoring pumps, adding chemicals when needed, and other various maintenance needs to keep the pools running smooth for the summer months.

## Grounds

- Planning for the Park District and user group special events/tournaments are underway with staff.
- Staff continue to bring the climbing wall over to camp on Tuesdays & Thursdays for the duration of summer camp.
- Staff have purchased six more grey flip top lid garbage cans. Staff will continue to put these by pavilions and playgrounds and removing more of the blue 55-gallon barrels.

### Parks

- Staff have been trying to keep up with the weeds in the park's playgrounds and hard surface athletic courts.
- Our crews continue to do daily repairs/park maintenance and continue doing parks/playground inspections. Staff have been cleaning up graffiti at parks as well; Poplar Park has been a targeted park this summer and the Parks police officer has been notified.
- Staff have been out cleaning/power washing pavilion pads that are being used for park rentals.

• With the seasonal staff here for the summer months they have been helping with painting and repairing picnic tables.

### **Athletics**

- Staff are out doing off-season repairs on the fields which include fence repairs and field repairs (adding ball mix where needed & clay brick repairs on pitchers' mounds and batters' boxes).
- The crew continues to drag fields to keep them ready for sports leagues and for the community to use.
- Soccer, football, and baseball spring/summer seasons have wrapped up until late summer/early fall. There are a few camps out on the fields through the summer months, and staff have been doing prep to those fields for the camps.
- Prep for the Labor Day Bolingbrook Soccer Club Tournament has begun.

# Natural Resources Horticulture & Turf

- The Park District received another grant from Trees Forever. This grant is for the replacement of trees that were removed at Knights of Columbus Park with the other Trees Forever Grant. The removal of trees at Knights of Columbus has been completed by the contractor.
- Staff have finalized going through proposals for the Urban Forestry Grant and has decided to go with Davey as the contractor.
- Staff continue to water flowers and trees in the parks and at the Recreation Centers.
- The horticulture and natural resource crews have been cutting dead trees in various parks.

### Natural Resources

- The natural resources crew has been working on controlling perennial weeds such as teasel, thistle, crown vetch, and bird's-foot trefoil in our natural areas via herbicide applications.
- Staff have been controlling annual and biennial weeds such as sweet clover, queen anne's lace, and black mustard by mowing and brush cutting.
- Staff are out spraying tree rings, turf weeds, and cracks in the trails.
- Staff have been out mowing natural areas to control invasive species.

### Horticulture

• The horticulture crew has been weeding the park district's annuals and landscape beds.

## Turf

• The turf crew has been focusing on keeping our parks and athletic fields mowed and looking great.

# **Project Updates**

- The annual district sealcoating began the week of July 7.
- Indoor Pelican Harbor shutdown will begin on Saturday, July 26. Contractors will begin removing existing concrete to make appropriate ADA modifications, along with replacement of indoor lighting above the zero-depth pool. Surfacing the indoor zero depth pool will begin the week of August 4 while electricians remain on site to continue with lighting modifications. Upon completion of the lighting and surfacing, contractors will mobilize back onsite to begin acid washing, sealing of concrete, along with installation of new fencing under slides of the zero-depth pool. Throughout the construction, new picnic tables and benches will be constructed and installed prior to reopening.
- New fencing inside Ivanhoe Park tennis courts were installed to separate the two newly color-coated pickleball courts. Surfacing at the tennis courts were modified from two tennis courts to one tennis / pickleball court and two dedicated pickleball courts. This brings the district's total of dedicated pickleball courts to eight (8).
- Gateway Wetlands playground is nearing completion. Staff are working with the contractor to finalize a few last-minute concerns. Anticipate the playground being complete by end of July.
- Staff are awaiting dates for the Knights of Columbus Trail renovation. Prior to construction, staff are working alongside the Village of Bolingbrook to correct some stormwater work needed in the area. Anticipate construction to commence late August, early September.
- Lily Cache Irrigation project is awaiting install dates. Work consists of a new submersible pump, new VFD and a new controller.

# **RECREATION AND FACILITIES**

# **Recreation Division**

### Pre School

 Preschool enrollment is ongoing for the 2025-2026 school year with 106 enrollees, this is 8 less than July last year. New for this school year is the non-refundable registration fee and 1<sup>st</sup> Preschool Tuition Installment which makes registration more expensive at the time of enrollment. In June there were 4 families that canceled out of Preschool due to moving out of Bolingbrook.

## Early Childhood

• Early childhood summer June session had 19 children enrolled from Preschool Camp. Preschool Practice, Kindergarten Countdown, Wonders of Nature, Summer Science and Little Learners had 103 children enrolled in 3- or 4-week sessions. The same classes are offered for July with the enrollment already at 102 with classes starting the week of July 7.

### Dance

- BPD Dance Company closed out its 2024/2025 season with a performance at the Joliet Slammers game on Sunday, July 6. BPD Dance Company begins the start of its 2025/2026 season on July 21 with a choreography camp and will host its first event, a kickoff to the new season for dancers and their families, at Pelican Harbor on July 27.
- Our second session of summer dance classes began on Monday, July 7 with 82 participants enrolled. Dance Camp will take place July 14-18 with 4 students.

### Theatre

 Theatre summer classes began on June 4. There are 4 enrolled in our Mini Broadway Stars class, 6 enrolled in Improv, and 8 enrolled in our Summer Showcase program. Theatre Summer Showcase will take place on Wednesday, August 6 at 5:00 pm in the Annerino Multipurpose Room. This show is free to attend. Our next one day, theatre workshop will be an Improv Workshop on July 14.

### Gymnastics/Cheer/Ninja

- The summer session for gymnastics, cheer and ninja classes is in full swing!
- Current enrollment numbers for the summer are:
  - Preschool: 97 Teams: 25
  - Developmental: 172 Ninjas: 87
- The Illusions Gymnastics Team performed on stage at the Village Picnic on Sunday, June 29. They showcased their tumbling and dance skills. Two girls also performed their floor routines to the crowd.

- Parent Tot open gyms are offered in the gymnastics gym Friday mornings from 9:30am-10:15am; 45 per child. Adult gymnastics open gyms are offered Friday afternoons from 2:00-4:00pm.
- June Party Stats: Nerf/Ninja/Gymnastics: 8 parties / 107 guests.

#### Day Camp

- Day Camp began on June 2 and will run through August 8. Camp Alotta Fun has hosted an average of 319 campers per week through the first five weeks of the ten-week program. This is an increase from last year that had an average of 303 for the first five weeks.
- In July, in-house entertainment for all campers will include the annual Glow Party and Camp Carnival, with outbound field trips to Hollywood Blvd Theaters, Enchanted Castle and Family Fun Zone. The weekly Teen Mini-Trips for July include Green Valley Forest Preserve, Isle a la Cache Museum, Phillips Park Zoo and a trip to Annerino Community Center to enjoy the indoor climbing wall and an outdoor archery class.



- Insurance members are at 1,087.



### **Operations/Special Events**

- Outdoor Pelican Harbor is open daily through August 17. The outdoor pool will be open from August 17-24 with limited attractions. Please check the website for attraction availability. The indoor pool will be closed from July 25-August 24 for its annual maintenance shutdown.
- Shade shells have been a huge hit this summer and continue to be available via online reservations or in-person at the gate day of through the remainder of the outdoor season. All day rentals for \$40 per shade shell.

#### Swim Lessons

- In June, swim lessons saw a total of 512 participants. An increase from the 111 in May due to the expanded summer offerings and staff availability. In June of 2024, swim lessons saw a total of 538 participants. The decrease is due to competition in the community and the delayed end date of multiple school districts in the area.
- Year-to-date swim lessons have made a total of \$213,547.50 in revenue.
- Summer swim lessons will end on July 24.

#### Swim Team




#### SEO Initiatives Showing Success











## **Bolingbrook Park District Customer Care Initiatives**

- Banquet revenue exceeded budget by \$9,138.


### **Operational Expenses**
